Forensic nurses are registered nurses who received specialized education and training to provide care to patients who experienced victimization or violence such as sexual assault, domestic violence, child or elder abuse, human trafficking, assault, or homicide. They also called at scene of crime to assess and collect evidence such as specialized digital photographs of injuries, specimens such as semen, blood, skin tissue, hirs or fibres, and swabs for DNA analysis, clothing, bullets, etc. from the perpetrator or scene of the crime. They are the first point of contact between the victim of crime and the health care system and the bodies of victims of physical assault and violence, living or dead, and collect the physical evidences required for criminal investigations. They consult, cooperate, and communicate with law enforcement agencies, and sometimes they can be called on to testify in court or law as expert witness. They are also educated in psychosocial skills to provide comfort, emotional support, and education to the victims and their relatives, especially during taking consent for physical examination, preparation for surgical procedure and collection of evidence [3].

Forensic nurses may be employed with the organizations that deal with domestic violence and ill-treatment of elderly. They often called on to assist after mass disasters natural or manmade and other crises in communities. Advanced forensic nurse practitioners also work directly within the legal system as legal nurse consultants, they help in investigation and provide expert opinions for lawyers while preparing their cases. Therefore their practice integrates with sociology (socio-political impact), criminology (violence, crime, social sanctions, criminal justice and human rights), clinical and criminal investigations (forensic science) and education (nursing and medicolegal knowledge, education to staff, patient and their clints) [4,5].

Certification Opportunities

The Commission for Forensic Nursing Certification (CFNC) currently offers two professional credentials: the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner-Adult/Adolescent (SANE-A*) and

the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner-Paediatric (SANE-P*). Both credentials are recognized by the American Nurses Credentialing Centre's (ANCC) Magnet Program*. From 2012-2017, the CFNC collaborated with the American Nurses Credentialing Center to offer its credential by portfolio in Advanced Forensic Nursing [6].

Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE-A*/SANE-P*) - The earned credentials of SANE-A* and SANE-P* designate that the recipient has achieved the highest standards of forensic nursing for sexual assault nurse examiners. Nurse examiners initially become certified by meeting the eligibility requirements and achieving a passing score on the certification examination [7].

Types of Services

Clinical Forensic Nurse

Provide care to survivors of crime related violence, injury and death that occur within the healthcare institutions and prepare documents and collect evidences.

Forensic Nurse Investigator

Work with coroner / medical examiner's to help in scientific investigation and circumstances of death.

Forensic Nurse Examiner

Help in analysis of physical and psychopathological evaluation of trauma and suspected death.

Forensic Custodial or Institutional Nurse

Specialized in the care, treatment and rehabilitation of person who have been sentenced prisons or jails.

Legal Nurse Consultant

Appear as an expert witness and educate judicial personals about personal injuries, product liabilities, and malpractice both in civil and criminal cases.

Nurse Attorney

A registered nurse with a juris doctorate degree practice as attorney at law specialized in civil and criminal cases related to health care issues.

Nurse Coroner

Registered nurse serving as investigator and certification of death in question to determine manner and cause of death, identify the deceased and inform to his/her relative.
